our year in review

Last year, we made a significant difference in the lives of 31,470,549 people living in 35 different countries, with over half of the recipients being women and girls. This is an increase of nearly 10 million more people from 2021. Our efforts spanned across 193 projects, and we're proud to share that we provided critical services almost 40 million times.

Our work on Neglected Tropical Diseases like 'sleeping syndrome' and 'river blindness,' which tend to impact the world's most disadvantaged while getting the least attention, allowed us to reach 9.8 million people in Kenya and Ethiopia alone. We also extended our services to over one million people to

combat tuberculosis, which remains a significant threat in many parts of the world. As the cornerstone of our work, our maternal and childcare outreach provided essential services to 1.7 million girls, women, and families, and we're happy to announce we've trained over 60,000 new community and facility-based health workers!

Integrating services is key to creating lasting health change, and this is one thing we really focused on in 2022. We remain committed to providing sustainable healthcare access to those in need and are grateful for your support in making a positive impact on the lives of millions of Africans across the continent!









- 48,032 community health workers trained in person and 1,433 trained with eLearning
- 9,363 facility-based health workers trained in person and 1,882 trained with eLearning
- 3,441 health facilities supported
- 2,483 health workers completed training through our Institute of Capacity Building, furthering their skills with 97% learning how to diagnose and treat malaria and TB

Reproductive, Maternal, Newborn, **Child and Adolescent Health**

- 318,340 babies delivered with help from a skilled professional
- 227.573 children immunized
- 179,291 women received pre-natal services
- 22,613 women received post-natal services
- 49,521 responses to gender-based violence cases
- 707,351 people received family planning services
- 55 fistula repairs and 480 fistula survivors reached
- 77 other gynecological surgeries

Neglected Tropical Diseases

- 9.8M people reached through Mass Drug Administration campaigns
- 6,800+ people with trachoma received eyelid surgery
- 1,300+ people with epilepsy in South Sudan received anti-convulsive treatment



An additional **2,235** patients, of which **29**% are under 18, were able to regularly receive treatment for epilepsy.

- 642,454 people gained access to sanitation and hand washing facilities
- 252,713 people received hygiene products

Disease Control, Prevention, and Management



- 21.5M COVID-19 vaccine doses delivered
- 740,810 people tested for malaria, and 458,251 placed on treatment
- 1.1M tested for HIV/AIDS, and 177,117 placed on treatment
- 1.4M people screened for TB and 23,954 placed on
- 8,898 people tested for diabetes, and 8,576 placed on treatment
- 3,441 health facilities supported

Water Is Life: 2022 World Water Day Limited Edition **Benefit Pitchers**

Lack of access to clean water and proper sanitation is one of the most common public health challenges in many communities across the African continent. This has become especially prevalent in the wake of climate change, which is disproportionately affecting low- and middle-income countries. The communities we work with, especially those in rural areas, are facing a water crisis that is a threat to their health and livelihoods.

To bring awareness to World Water Day 2022, we raised funds for our water and sanitation programs, while also celebrating the work of contemporary Black artists through a limited edition run of water pitchers. Kefeta Program, Ethiopia

- 300 youth placed into internships
- 1,300 youth employed in public and private companies
- 36,000 youth trained on various topics such as financial literacy, civic engagement, and employability
- 17 youth coalitions established with 60,000 members
- 30 service delivery outlets remodeled to provide youthfriendly health services in 17 cities
- 200,000+ youth received comprehensive sexual health, reproductive, and family planning services
